Interdisciplinary Courses

The Architecture of Justice (Study Abroad course)

This course was taught in Berlin, Germany during June-July 2015 as well as June 2017. I will teach it again during July 2019. I co-created and co-taught the course with Prof. Kristina Yu, UNM School of Architecture. She is a practicing architect and a scholar of memory and design. Tim Green, an alumnus of our graduate program, is also an instructor in the course. His focus is on international criminal law as well as transitional justice and education. He is now a doctoral student in the School of Education and a teacher at the Bosque School. Cory Greenfield, a practicing architect and adjunct faculty member of the School of Architecture, is part of the faculty for this course. He has also designed memory sites around the world. He worked for one of the firms who participated in the architectural competition for the National African-American Museum in Washington, D.C. Students who have taken the course include graduate and undergraduate students in Architecture, Planning and Political Science.

The course focuses on the role of architecture and city planning in conducting mass human rights violations and conversely their role in memory efforts like museums, memorials, monuments, and other sites of memory following periods of mass atrocities. We examine the layers of atrocities within a city's history and the networks of related and layered memory sites. The course is unique globally given the collaboration between architects and political scientists on transitional justice issues especially with respect to the role of reparations in architecture and planning. After several years of teaching this course, we are developing a related research project. Guest lecturers are practitioners and scholars working on these issues across the globe.

Transitional Justice: Political Science and International Law Perspectives

The affiliated appointment in The School of Law offers an opportunity to present my research and teach (limitedly) in the law school. This course is an interdisciplinary course that I co-created and co-taught with Prof. Jenny Moore (School of Law). This course was cross-listed in the UNM School of Law and the Political Science Department. Students in the course included graduate students in Political Science and law students in the School of Law. It is focused on political science and legal scholarship focused on transitional justice with a focus on reparations. We taught this course in Spring, 2014.

The Globalization of Reparations Movements

This course is interdisciplinary in content. I created and taught the course to undergraduate and graduate students in the UNM Program of Africana Studies and the Political Science department. The course focused on reparations efforts across the globe including the African diaspora. I have an affiliated appointment in the Program of Africana Studies. I taught this course during winter session in January 2009.

Non-University Teaching

Prison Justice Initiative, Georgetown University

I was a recurring guest lecturer in Marc Howard's (Department of Government) course (during 2014-2016), World History, which he taught at the Jessup Correctional Facility in its Prison Education program and Georgetown University's Prison Justice Initiative. The correctional facility is a maximum-security prison for men. My class sessions focused on human rights and reparations.
